

The Church is at Tudeley and is the only Church to have all its windows designed by Marc Chagall. The first window was commissioned by the parents of Sarah d'Avigdor-Goldsmid, who died aged just 21, in a sailing accident off Rye. The remainder were Chagall's response to seeing the first in situ and being impressed with his own work! All the windows are predominantly a startling blue and the effect in a simple, fairly

plain village church is breath-taking. The windows tell the story of the goodness of creation, of the fall, the redemption of Christ and the promise of restoration and recreation. Although the reason for the installation of the windows was a tragic event, the beauty and complex symbolism within them is a source of great spiritual resonance and of hope. This year has been one of great political upheaval, and of manmade and natural tragedies. Renewed hope and confidence in the future is what we all are praying for as we bring ourselves into a state of preparedness for our celebrations of the birth of Christ.

#### A remarkable birth

Where did the last twelve months go so quickly? It only seems like a few weeks ago that we were packing up the Christmas tree lights, taking down the Christmas cards, promising to get back in touch with long lost friends soon, and bracing ourselves for a weighty credit card statement hitting the doormat in January. Here we are braced to do it all again!

I wonder, does Christmas fill you with joy, anticipation and a child-like wonder, or are you more likely to batten down the hatches and hope that it all passes without incident? Does the festive season mean getting together with extended family, sociable neighbours and good friends, to celebrate life, to overindulge, and to exchange gifts, or does it bring to mind sad memories, perhaps of those we have loved and lost?

At this point in my musings, I must offer a confession - I love Christmas! I count myself as enormously privileged to be able to celebrate the true meaning of Christmas for several weeks in my vocation as

I love sharing the Good News of the birth of Jesus, because we can always find hope in Jesus. His life was one characterised by love and sacrificial service, and his example is one which is followed to this day by millions whose lives have been transformed in choosing to follow in his footsteps.

Whether your Christmas will be busy or quiet, I wish you the joy and the peace of Christ. To those who have the opportunity to open their doors and to welcome in others, I encourage



you to do so as we share that wonderful community spirit which exists in our parish.

# Up, up and away

I was lucky enough to be given a voucher for two 'winch glider flights' for my recent 'special' birthday.

On the agreed day, thankfully beautifully sunny, Bob drove us out to an airfield just outside Bicester. Luckily our youngest son Neal was off duty that afternoon and 5 year old grandson, Jack, was off school for an Inset Day so they were both able to join us.

I had to start by watching a short film on emergency procedures in the event of need to bail out and descend by parachute - not the



most reassuring start! Anyway once that was over and the necessary documents signed, I was picked up by car and driven out to the centre of the airfield. Here I was greeted by a very cheerful man and told to wait and watch as the person before me finished their flight.

Finally it was time to start!! – I was introduced to my Pilot and helped to get the parachute strapped on and then it was time to get into the very tiny glider. It had a transparent dome, which I was advised not to pull on as I got in. "It's just like getting into the bath" said pilot Brian: but I don't usually get into the bath with a great weighty parachute strapped on my back! However I eventually managed to

get into the front seat with my feet reaching right into the nose. Brian

got into the back and assured me he would be doing the flying 90% of the time but I would get a chance to take the controls. He took me through all the different controls within the cockpit, and I promised I would not be touching ANY of them until told to do so.

We were going to be projected into the air by a mechanical winch connected to the nose of the

glider by a wire; once in the air Brian would uncouple the wire and we would be gliding.

There was a really sudden start as the winch started up, and we climbed very steeply. I felt dragged down into my seat; all I could see was the sky and I had forgotten all about waving goodbye to Jack. Then there was a slight jerk when the wire was uncoupled and we were gliding.

It wasn't silent as I had supposed as there was the rush of the wind around us. Brian tilted us to left and right, put the nose down and pulled it back up again. He explained that, ideally, we should have 50% sky and 50% land in our view, with the horizon level with a line inscribed on the cockpit cover. Brian pointed out things that we could see around us on the ground; then he told me I could take hold of the 'joy-stick' which was between my knees. I could hear him clap his hands in the seat behind me indicating that he wasn't holding his joystick any more – I was in control! He told me how to move the joystick and I raised and lowered the nose on my own. I quickly suggested he should take control again!

After a few minutes of gently gliding around we came into land again and were immediately re-coupled to the winch ready for the second go. The ascent wasn't as much of a shock this time, but I told Brian I was happy to let him do all the flying now, whilst I took pictures of all I could see below me. All too soon it was time to come down to land again and try getting out of that 'bath', again without pulling on the cockpit cover! I finally managed to get out and unclipped all the straps for the parachute. Brian presented me with a certificate to mark the event and I was able to walk proudly back to Bob, Neal and Jack, who showed me all the photos they had taken of my adventure. Would I recommend it to others as something worth doing – **Oh YES without a doubt!** 

#### What's it all about....?

We are going to include in the magazine a series of short articles about aspects of national and local governance of the Church of England so that you can understand how we operate as a national Church and how we operate within our own Church here at St Michael and All Angels. The purpose is for us all to understand better our workings and for us all to be able to take a closer part in both the worship and the workings of our Church and thus to enable us all to fulfil our Mission Statement to "enable all to follow JESUS CHRIST."

Firstly: within St Michael's, we briefly look at the work of the task groups. These groups are: communications, briefly reported on below, prayer; youth, mission, and social and outreach. Each group will briefly explain their doings (though we suspect the activities of the last are the most well-known).

#### **Communications**

The communications task group has the remit to enhance communications within and outside the Church. In particular we were initially asked by PCC to develop a consistent and appropriate style for such things as notices. We have concentrated on developing, not quite a house style, but the use of an overarching logo, better display of information and removal of out of date or scruffy notices. We hope that you have noticed an improvement in the noticeboards and on the table at the rear of the church. Ben Brice continually has the website (our public face) under review and enhancement and notes how and when it is accessed. By the time you read this, the new front gate notice board will be on display and the final stage of refurbishment of the pin board area will soon follow. We are now moving to improve some of the methods by which long term information can be stored more effectively and updated as appropriate. Our next tasks will be to look at ways of enhancing external communication. We report to PCC. If you have ideas to improve what we do, or queries, please contact me.

#### And now, about the wider Church governance:

#### 1. The General Synod.

The Church of England is part of the worldwide Anglican Communion. In England it is divided into three provinces – the Archdiocese of Canterbury, led by Archbishop Justin Welby, the Archdiocese of York, led by Archbishop John Sentamu and the Church in Wales, led by Archbishop Barry Morgan. There are separate arrangements for Scotland, dating from the Act of Union in 1707. The Scottish Episcopalian Church is a member of the Anglican Communion but separate from both the Church of England and the Church in Wales. Its "Primus" is Bishop David Chillingworth, Bishop of St Andrews, Dunkeld and Dunblane.

**General Synod** is the senior governing body of the Church of England: both Provinces meet together to preside over the governance of our part of the Anglican Communion. The General Synod is the national assembly of the Church of England. It came into being in 1970 under the Synodical Government Measure 1969, replacing an earlier body known as the Church Assembly. It has powers in the following areas:

Legislation by Measure, to pass Measures which, if approved by resolution of each House of Parliament, receive Royal Assent and thereby become part of the law of England; legislation by Canon, subject to Royal Licence and Assent.

Relations with other Churches: to regulate the Church of England's relations with other churches and to make provisions for matters relating to worship and doctrine. It can make provision by Act of Synod, regulation or other instrument in cases where legislation by or under a Measure or Canon is not necessary.

Liturgy and Doctrinal Assent: to approve, amend, continue or discontinue liturgies and make provision for any matter (except the publication of banns of marriage) to which rubrics of the Book of Common Prayer relate and to ensure that the forms of service contained in the Book of Common Prayer continue to be available for use in the Church of England. The Synod also decides the form in which ministers and officers of the Church of England are required to assent to the doctrine of the Church of England (the Declaration of Assent).

Deliberation: to consider any other matters of religious or public interest.

Finance: to approve (or reject) the central Church budget each year.

#### A letter from Ebenezer

Dear sponsors of Ebenezer Orphanage Home.

I am called Enos Birusu a former student of the above institution. I would like to tell you my sad story before I went to Ebenezer. First of all I did never saw my father! He died when I was only few months born. The most worst was when my uncles sent away our mother and took our father's house and land away in the name of caring for us. Our mother ran away and left us alone.

I was desperately lost in my sorrows without any one to care for me. I could not go to school, had no clothes on me and very sick. My salvation came when I heard of Ebenezer and decided to take myself there. That was the Genesis of my victory. I would like to give thanks to God for enabling me to get this far through Ebenezer by your help. I was one of the very first orphan children admitted at Ebenezer Orphanage Home and managed to get through the Ebenezer Primary and Secondary schools respectively up to university and up to my graduation with a degree of Applied Biological Sciences at Kampala International University (KIU). My story is a miracle and a testimony to tell everyone.

I am very happy to reach this time of my graduation under the care of Ebenezer but much more with the support of mama Rita and the many other supportive members of the Hughenden Church in the UK.

... I never got a chance to have a direct sponsor from the UK but Rev. Samson ... allowed me and many others the opportunity to study and equally benefit like all other orphans at Ebenezer. ...4 of us were selected to be allowed to continue our education up to university. That is when my miracle started. Ebenezer managed to pay all my university tuition including the very last graduate fee. What more should I say??

I AM VERY GRATEFUL TO GOD, TO EBENEZER ORPHANAGE HOME AND THE EBENEZER SCHOOLS FOR ALLOWING TO EXCELL THIS FAR. I AM SO HAPPY FOR THE UK SUPPORT THROUGH MAMA RITA JOY PULLY, REV. CHRIS VIVIAN. ON A VERY SPECIAL NOTE, THE HUGHENDEN CHURCH AND THE URC CHURCHES.

#### **Situations Vacant!**

#### Diocese of Oxford School Admission Appeals Panels

Are you employed as a teacher or within the education service? Do you know about schools and how they operate? Are you legally trained?

If you can answer **No** to all those questions, **GOOD!** Oxford Diocese is looking for new lay members to sit on their appeals panels for Church Schools and Academies.

You would be part of a team of three people hearing appeals by parents against refusals by schools to admit their children, together with the schools' reasons why they could not admit.

It follows a structured process but you would not be 'judge and jury' although the decision made by the panel is binding on both sides. All panel members are trained before being let loose on hearing appeals and there are always people to help and guide you – particularly on the day of an appeal when you will be supported by a clerk.

There's no salary attached but you will get travel expenses and refreshments. There are no set hours and no set number of days – you volunteer to do as much or as little as you wish.

Admission appeals are a very necessary part of the service provided by the Diocese for its Church Schools and Academies and if you are

willing to join the existing panel members you will find a warm and friendly welcome awaiting you.

## The power of prayer

Having shared this with the prayer team at one of our meetings, I was asked if I would write about it for the magazine.

First, the background: I've always had sinus problems. In my early twenties I had an operation on my nose. The results were wonderful. For the first time ever I could breathe through my nose. Speaking, eating and sleeping became a pleasure. I was told it wouldn't last forever and it would need doing again eventually.

I had another operation, years later, not quite as successful, after the effects of the first operation wore off. It got to the stage a couple of years ago when I decided I couldn't fly abroad any more. The descent always caused agony in my ears. I took painkillers before the descent and a sinus spray during the flight but I was often deaf for about three days after the flight, not to mention the pain and stress I was having. I even had problems in the car going up and down hills.

Then last year I went to Spring Harvest. Each evening there is a guest speaker at the main event. This particular evening there was a woman who had flown in, just for that evening, and was flying back the next morning. From the beginning, I am ashamed to say, I thought she was scruffy. The speakers are usually quite smart and she had combat trousers on and looked as if she had just got off a plane on which she had been trying to sleep for hours - as she obviously had. She was full of energy and paced about the stage talking about God. Then she asked the Holy Spirit to be with us. "He's here" she said. "The Holy Spirit is here with us." I wondered how she knew, since I didn't feel aware of it. Then she said," the Holy Spirit is here in this part of the auditorium now," and indicated an area to her right. Surely, I thought, the Holy Spirit can be everywhere and not confined to one particular place.

She then said there were people in the audience with particular ailments and invited then down to the front for prayer. She named a few ailments and a lot of people started going down to the front. I assured myself that if it were me, I would never go to the front as she was obviously a fake. Then she said "there's someone here with a sinus problem - come down to the front to be prayed for." I reminded myself how many people had sinus problems and sat tight. "It's a chronic condition," she said. "Ongoing. You've had it a

long time." I stayed in my seat and thought: I'm not going down.

"You don't have to come down," she said. "Ask the person next to you to pray for you." I did nothing. But I was beginning to wonder. Just before the end of the service, just in case she was genuine and I was mistaken, I asked Ann Long, who was sitting beside me, to pray for my sinuses. She did, the service ended and there was no change. There you are I thought, as I walked out. What did you expect? But over the next two weeks it gradually cleared up. No more pain in the ears, no more sinus headaches: all clear. I was arateful to God and ashamed of my unbelief and my attitude to the speaker. Recently, I caught a cold: the first since Spring Harvest. I dread colds because they often lead to severe complications. The cold appeared to go but I could feel my lungs were starting to get congested so I was worried. Sunday came and I had said I would be there for the prayer team, a trained and confidential group available for those who would like prayer after Communion. I woke up feeling poorly but I had the feeling I should go and ask the prayer team, to pray for my health, particularly my lungs.

The path up to church took it out of me. It's steep if your lungs aren't working properly. I asked for prayer but said I couldn't be part of the team that day. They prayed for me and for health for my lungs and I then sat at the back of church in case I needed to go home. I was so breathless I couldn't sing the first hymn but then it eased. I sang the remaining hymns and stayed to the end.

Over the next few days it cleared. I can't remember when a cold previously hasn't led to one or two lots of antibiotics, more asthma Inhalers and general debility.

So this is to say: how great is our God! He knows us individually and knows what our problems are. He can heal us. There are times when he doesn't. I have no idea why. I don't know why someone else had to pray for me. Why didn't my prayers for myself work? But why should I know everything. I am not the creator.

#### **Valley Friends**

#### Forty Years catching smugglers!

On Friday 4th November, Malcolm Nelson gave a very interesting talk about his career as a Customs and Excise Officer. He described it as 40 years of excitement, comedy and tragedy, working with and meeting amazing people. During his talk, Malcolm outlined what makes a good Customs Officer. It is mainly experience gained on the job, but initial training programmes have to be attended. Malcolm joined the trainees at the Waterguard Training Centre in Southend where he learned that customs officers have to have inquiring minds. They have to cope with a range of communication techniques and soon realise that catching smugglers is a quite scientific operation. The trainees were warned never to trust anyone in a suit, but also never to under-estimate them. Drug smugglers often work in teams and, shockingly, 80% of all drugs entering Britain come via Heathrow: the reason being that the turn-round time there can be as little as 30 minutes, and "time is money". The passenger lists are examined and those who are travelling from countries where drugs are more commonplace, e.g. Bolivia, Islamabad, Mombasa, the Caribbean etc, are tracked. Tarmac officers feel for double skins on cases where things can be hidden. The smell of drugs can be disguised but sniffer dogs can detect drugs, even if swallowed.

The experienced smuggler will always act calmly when stopped and sometimes is too calm which raises suspicion. Some drugs are carried under wigs and, amazingly, some wigs are sewn to the scalp making detection difficult. Some businessmen may be carrying many clothes in their luggage but look shabby. Malcolm told us many other interesting stories and ways in which smugglers disguise what they are carrying: like the lady carrying a very heavy case, which was full of stitched up bananas. Malcolm has written a book about his experiences, copies of which were on sale. Malcolm was thanked and applauded for a very Interesting evening.

The One Can Trust is invited to collect non-perishable food at Tesco in High Wycombe from Thursday to Saturday, December 1st to 3rd, from 9 am to 7 pm. If you feel you would like to be involved in this venture and are able to spare an hour or two, please contact Steph, Project Manager at One Can Foodbank, on 01494 512177 or at www.onecantrust.org.uk She will be delighted to hear from you. If you go in for traditional Advent Calendars they have another suggestion on their website whereby you put aside a box and on each day of Advent you pop a can or coin in the box. You can find out all about it on the above website together with a list of items they would appreciate. Failing that their urgent needs as of 8th November are – Long life milk, Tinned Tomatoes, Tinned Spaghetti, Tinned meats (pies, curry, chilli, chicken), Rice (500g or more), Pasta, pasta sauces, Toiletries (shampoo/soap), Washing up Liquid, Loo rolls and Bags for life).

If you would like to volunteer for the Wycombe Homeless Connection, there's still time to sign up to help at the Night Shelter from January 2<sup>nd</sup> to March 31<sup>st</sup> 2017 season. If you are not able to make yourself available onsite, there may be something you can do offsite such as laundry, baking cakes, praying etc. There are training sessions available and all the information you need is on their

website. If you feel you would like to support them in another way by giving, there is an updated list, of their needs as of November 14th but do call the office ahead to check any changes and to arrange drop off. As I write this the 'Big Sleep Out' is just three days away when those brave and stoic volunteers will sleep rough around All Saints Church in Wycombe thus experiencing what it's like to be homeless for just one night. You will be able to see the results for yourself on their website well before the next copy of Outlook in February. Let's pray that it will be a huge success bringing in funds for Wycombe Homeless Connection to help many homeless people throughout the year to move on with their lives.

I would like to thank the ladies of the Dorcas Laundry Team at St Michael's and the Methodist Church for all their hard work during the year. Collectively we have prepared a huge amount of clothing which is then packed into Dorcas' handmade carriers and given to families in great need. I would also like to thank all of you who have dropped bags of clothes on my doorstep and knitted and assembled baby blankets; Jo Preston is delighted with all that you have donated and our input has made many struggling Mums very happy.

Do remember street ministries over the Christmas and New Year period – Street Angels who are out at very unsociable hours offering a helping hand, companionship and good conversations with those out on the street very early on a Saturday morning, the Healing on the Streets Team who you can find in Wycombe, close to Millets, on a Saturday afternoon offering healing prayer to members of the public and Chefs for Jesus situated just outside the Parish Church in Wycombe every Saturday morning serving soup with bread, hot drinks and cakes to members of the public; each ministry evident in all weathers.

Lastly, the Christmas Service Card will be in both St Michael's and the Methodist Church early in December. Long before it gets laid out on a table at the back of the church, a huge amount of work takes place preparing it for printing and then a small group of willing helpers pack the cards into streets ready for delivery so that every home in the parish has one. Around 2,500 cards are distributed through letterboxes in the run up to Christmas taking our Ministers' message into every home. Some years ago we had a prayer to say

as we delivered the cards and this year Keith has composed one for us to say before we leave on our travels, which will be included with each pack of cards. We do rely heavily on you all to help with the deliveries and we ask for your support again this year so that all the cards are delivered by the Sunday before Christmas.

Our committed prayer days for this month and next month are Monday December 12<sup>th</sup> and Monday, January 9<sup>th</sup>. The prayer space will be set up in Church House from 8.00 am to Tuesday 8.00 am with all the usual facilities available. Prayerfully consider signing up for one hour, or part of an hour, bringing before God all the ministries working to help those less fortunate achieve a better life. The signup sheet will be found on the table at the back of the church, around the same time as the Outlook magazine, together with the Prayer Points. I pray that you will all have a blessed Christmas.

# What is Mothers' Union all about – part 2

You will probably have seen that last month's Outlook had multiple articles related to Mothers' Union, including one just telling you the basics about Mothers' Union as an organisation.

This month I'd like to tell you what Hughenden Branch Mothers' Union does in support of the life and activities of St. Michael and all Angels. Many activities are initiated and run by Mothers' Union and many others receive a significant level of support from people who just happen to be MU members!

Gosh where do I start?

If we start with the youngest members of our community and church family; MU members ensure that the monthly Tiny Tots service runs smoothly by arriving early and setting out delicious homemade refreshments for both the children and their Mum/Dads/Carers etc. Of course MU also mastermind the very popular Teddy Bears Picnic for pre-school children and their carers, which takes place in June. The Mothers' Union garden is set out with a tables groaning under the weight of child-friendly food and the grass bedecked in picnic

blankets ready for families to occupy as they chat and eat, before enjoying a Bible story and popular activity songs.

The Creche rota for 10.45 services contains the names of many MU members, who want to allow parents of young children to enjoy the service in peace, and so help out with caring for their children in the Creche.

As we go up the age groups, MU members are also a significant part of the support team for our Christmas Unwrapped and Easter Eggsplained sessions, whereby we welcome the Year 6 children from two local schools to partake in activities organised by Wycombe Youth For Christ. MU members provide and serve squash and biscuits to the children when they arrive (including awareness of diabetics and allergy sufferers when necessary). We also offer the teachers and helpers the opportunity to sit and enjoy home-made goodies and coffee in the Vestry, whilst the children are engaged in activities in the Church and North Room. MU members are also the backbone of support for the craft activities in North Room that form a regular part of these sessions.

The coffee after the 10.45 service is regularly served by MU members, whilst Keith and the Ministry Team know that if refreshments are required for any special event such as All Souls Service, certain funerals, Deanery Synod meetings etc. they can always rely on Mothers' Union to step up, supply and serve them with a welcoming smile, and a listening ear if necessary.

But MU does not just do coffee, refreshments and child care. MU Members can regularly be found visiting those of our congregations who are in hospital or housebound and need someone to pop in for a chat. MU also masterminds the Advent Service at the beginning of December, during which a collection is taken to fund a small Christmas gift (plant or biscuits) for up to 30+ residents from the Parish who live alone, or are house-bound. MU members then go on to deliver every single one in the run up to Christmas. The Thank You letters and cards that are regularly received are testimony to the fact that these little gestures mean so much to those who are in receipt of them.

Finally (and it may be that there are still more areas of MU service that I have temporarily forgotten!) MU members can often be seen carrying casserole dishes and containers up to the front doors of

members of our community who are ill or infirm, so that they are relieved of the need to cook a meal that day.

I remember Simon Cronk, when he first arrived as Vicar, commented that on so many occasions, whatever was going on he could turn around and there would be members of the MU Branch serving the congregations and community of St. Michael and All Angels – I am sure that Keith is now feeling the same.

As I said last month if you think that you would like to get involved with any of this, or at least meet the people who are, then check the Church Calendar in Outlook for the first Tuesday of the month and pop along; we will be delighted to welcome you if only just for a chat.

# Mothers' Union: November I am Justin – I am a Christian

At our November meeting Justin Montague was our speaker. He told us about his journey from being a young boy to where he is today, an Ordinand training for the Ministry at Wycliffe Hall, University of Oxford.



Justin was born in a council house in Swindon where he lived with his mother and two brothers. He attended Sunday School and Cub Scouts but was a very restless lad, always wanting to be doing something. Physical activities gave him that release and he threw himself into all sorts of sports. However, he suffered badly from nightmares and he told a friend this. Justin had been to his friend's house on several occasions and noticed that his mother seemed to be talking to herself or singing. He later realized that she was, in fact, praying. His friend asked her to pray for Justin and following this, the nightmares vanished and he felt a sense of peace. Justin had a thirst to know more about Jesus but unfortunately at that time he had no real direction. He did not know what it meant to be a Christian and felt he was walking on the south side of the road but Jesus was on the other side. Through school and university, he did a lot of sport but

felt his faith was part time – he was a plastic Christian with no conviction. He knew there was more, but he put it to the back of his mind as there was always something else he wanted to do first. However, he knew that something was missing. He felt that he was putting faith into his life and not life into his faith.

Following university, where he attained a degree in Sports Science, he received wise words from a priest which led to Justin strongly questioning his lifestyle. 'The Lord was giving me a push', he said. He went to church, studied the Lord's word and crossed back over the road where he felt 'God called me to serve Him'. He did various jobs with the disabled, the elderly, disabled children, etc. He thought the Lord had something for him but he was still not willing. He decided the Military would be the answer so, following very arduous training, he joined the Royal Marines Commandos. He was not a typical Marine; he did not like guns and fighting but in the main he thoroughly enjoyed his eleven years with the Marines, despite the highs and lows. He would go to church at the base in order to find some peace. He had a small bible which went with him to Afghanistan where they were surrounded by insurgents on the front. He saw many upsetting things during this time and also lost several comrades. There were no quiet moments there so Justin just read his bible. He experienced some name-calling and teasing from some of the servicemen but managed to engage with others and had great discussions. Several had a very positive response to his faith and as he put his trust and faith in God, he felt at peace with Him.

After Justin returned from Afghanistan he felt the first call to ministry and chaplaincy. He was very ill for some time with post-traumatic stress syndrome and had eight operations, after which there followed intense rehabilitation. He felt physically at his weakest but strong in the Lord. As many in the bible were called to make big changes in their lives Justin knew he had to make the Lord his priority and be still to let his body heal and give it to God.

The last eighteen months had been incredible and he still has that wonderful sense of peace. He is now engaged to Melissa and they will be married next June. He finished with a few words from St Paul to the Hebrews: 'Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin

that so easily entangles, and let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us. Let us fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith....'.

Justin left the Marines in July of this year and began his training for the Ministry in October. We all felt he was an inspiring young man who would one day make a wonderful vicar.

On December 6<sup>th</sup> in Church House we have our annual Advent Service at 7.30 pm, followed by coffee and mince pies. At this time we will also be collecting items for Wycombe Women's Aid - as well as the usual toiletries, underwear, pyjamas, gift vouchers, towels and single duvet covers are always needed. There is no MU meeting in January and the AGM is on 7<sup>th</sup> February 2017 at 7.30 pm in Church House.

Bereft but calm.


And I at year's end

# December Recipe Crispy Duck Delight

One of my favourite meals around the happy time of Christmas is duck. I love to make an orange sauce and Bramley apple chunks as an accompaniment with a little chopped ginger, either fresh grated or from a jar of ginger in syrup. I also like a little chopped garlic – you



could use a small spoonful of ready chopped garlic or two cloves of fresh garlic chopped which makes a good flavour. In addition I use some brown sugar to balance the flavours and some cider.

#### **Ingredients**

6 plump duck thighs or legs

8 tblsps brown sugar (Muscovada if possible)

1 large Bramley apple, peeled, cored and chopped

Some root ginger coarsely grated or some finely chopped ginger in syrup from a jar.

A large pinch of ground cinnamon

½ pt medium dry cider

½ pt chicken or vegetable stock

The thinly pared skin of 1 large orange plus the juice

2 garlic cloves or a tsp of ready chopped

3 tblsps Balsamic vinegar

1 tblsp coarse sea salt

3 tblsps sunflower oil

#### **Method**

Preheat the oven to 170C/150C fan oven or Gas Mark 3. Place the duck in a flameproof dish just large enough to hold it in one layer. Add 6 tblsps of the sugar and the other ingredients, bring it to the boil on the hob and cook for 3 minutes over a medium heat. Then cover the dish with a double layer of tinfoil and transfer to the pre-heated oven for 2½ hrs. After this brush the duck pieces with the Balsamic vinegar, the coarse sea salt and the remaining sugar and put back into the oven for about 15 minutes until everything is hot. Serve the sauce with the duck. Roast potatoes, broccoli and chopped carrots go well with this dish.


